Religion and Politics in the US: from the Founding Fathers till nowadayss

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Résumé du cours – Objectifs - Course description – Targets

This course aims at three main objectives:

- first to understand the variety and evolutions of the religious landscape in the US, both as a specific feature and as a tool to better understand our own European panorama.
- second, to examine the reasons underlying the intricacies of religion and politics in the US, from the foundation of that country to present days' politics. That will lead us to reconsider secularization in modern societies.
- -Finally, by describing the complex relations between religion and society as a whole, we may understand how religion plays a decisive paper on contemporary issues such as race, gender, educational, and LGBTI topics.

Evaluation - Assessment

Students will be asked:

- to deliver a book report or an analysis of a set of documents, selected from a reading list/documents set issued by the professor (20%)
- -to deliver a short research paper on a contemporary issue on religion and politics taken from a list given by the professor (20%)
- to take a final exam (short questions and one essay-style one) (40%)
- to participate actively in class (20%) which means being able to interact with the professor and other students during sessions, having read the documents indicated for each session in order to participate properly and to maintain one's attention throughout sessions. The use of cell phones is strictly forbidden and will lead to a lowering of that grade if observed. The use of laptops is authorized but undue and compulsory consultation of unrelated sites during sessions will also have negative consequences on the participation grade.
